

Cosmologies

♦ Unusual features of buildings, serving symbolic rather than functional purposes, are merely a part of more complex patterns of symbolism which are woven into indigenous architecture, making them resonant with meaning.

The Badui

- ♦ Territory is prohibited to outsiders
- Reject wet rice agriculture, writing, money, and glass windows
- Inner and outer Badui, number of households must be constant
- Artja Domas at the centre, consists of 13 terraces topped by a tall column, a place where souls go after death



Orientation in Bali

- ♦ Very diverse village forms
- ♦ Three types of temples/pura:
 - Pura puseh (navel temple), built when the village was first founded
 - Pura dalam or graveyard temple
 - Pura balai agung or great council, temple of the gods, chiefly concerned with agricultural fertility




Village, House, and Cosmos in Sumba



- Typical Rindi village is roughly rectangular, sometimes surrounded by walls or fences
- ♦ Talora (open central plaza) is edged by rows of houses
- Rectangular stone graves are lined in the centre of the plaza

Village and Cosmos in Nias



- Houses faced inland, away from the sea
- High and inaccessible places were preferred
- Village layout usually a flight of stone steps leading to a single street lined with houses
- Houses are linked together with a corridor
